'The Time has Come,' Says IDF Chief of Staff, as Israel Strikes Iran

(JNS) – Lt. Gen. Eyal Zamir, the Israel Defense Forces chief of staff, addressed the nation early last Friday morning and said that "the time has come," as Israel attacked nuclear and military sites in Iran as part of an operation it has dubbed Rising Lion.

"This is a critical operation to prevent an existential threat by an enemy, who is intent on destroying us," Zamir said.

The military official assured the Israeli people that the Jewish state was acting "as a result of immediate and justified operational needs" and in order "to secure the future safety of the state and its citizens."

The IDF said earlier in the morning that the military "launched a preemptive, precise, combined offensive based on high-quality intelligence to strike Iran's nuclear program, and in response to the Iranian regime's ongoing aggression against Israel."

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, who has warned for years of the danger of a nuclear-armed Iran, said that the operation "will continue for as many days as it takes to remove this threat."

"We are at the point of no return. We cannot afford to wait for another time to operate. We have no other choice," Zamier said. "Recent and past events of history have taught us that when the enemy is attempting to destroy us, we must not turn a blind eye.

"We need to fight for our existence," he said. "Freedom was given to those willing to fight for it."

The IDF official said that the operation has been in the works for a long time, describing it as a "historic campaign unlike any other." He also cautioned that "anyone who will try to chal-

lenge us will pay a heavy price."


Zamir requested that Israeli citizens obey the instructions of the Home Front command, warning that the Islamic Republic would retaliate, and the toll would be different from what Israelis have grown to expect.

"Seventy-seven years since the State of Israel was established," he said, "we stand again for our survival." He called on Israelis to show "bravery, spirit and unity."

"Unlike the past, we face an enemy as a nation and regional power, with an army like no other," he said. "Beyond the technology, operational means and methods, we inhibit an additional unique element – the Zionist and Jewish spirit that beats within us.

"With this spirit, and faith in our justified path, our actions will speak," he said. **HW**

Donald Trump: 'Iran Must Make a Deal, Before There is Nothing Left'

(JTA) – President Donald Trump is pressing forward in seeking a nuclear deal with Iran following a massive wave of Israeli attacks on the country's nuclear program.

Trump, who has built his public per-

sona around a verve for making deals, addressed his now-weakened negotiating partner in a post on Truth Social last Friday morning, several hours after the Israelis began carrying out a daring and apparently successful mission in Iran that took aim at the places and personnel involved in the country's effort to develop a nuclear weapon.

Trump said in the post he had warned Iran that not making a deal would "be much worse than anything they know, anticipated, or were told."

He also implied that U.S. weapons had been used in the attack and that the United States would continue to supply Israel with weapons to attack Iran. Israel's perceived need for U.S. bombs that could penetrate underground had been seen as an obstacle to an Israeli attack on Iran's nuclear program.

"The United States makes the best and most lethal military equipment anywhere in the World, BY FAR," Trump said in his post, adding, "Israel has a lot of it, with much more to come – And they know how to use it."

Trump declined to comment on whether the United States had played a role in the attack in an interview with ABC News last Friday morning. But he praised the attack and warned of more.

"I think it's been excellent," he said in the interview. "We gave them a chance and they didn't take it. They got hit hard, very hard. They got hit about as hard as you're going to get hit. And there's more to come. A lot more."

Trump had said when opening talks with Iran in April, in a move that was seen as against Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's preferences, that if the talks failed, there would be severe reprisals. The United States would not be led into war, Trump cautioned but would head there willingly if needed.

Last Friday morning, as Israel launched another wave of attacks, Trump urged Iran to come to the negotiating table – saying in all caps in his Truth Social post that the cost of not doing so would be high.

"There has already been great death and destruction, but there is still time "We gave them a chance and they didn't take it," Trump told ABC News, without confirming whether the United States played a role in Israel's attack on Iran.

to make this slaughter, with the next already planned attacks being even more brutal, come to an end," Trump wrote. "Iran must make a deal, before there is nothing left, and save what was once known as the Iranian Empire. No more death, no more destruction, JUST DO IT, BEFORE IT IS TOO LATE."

Iran's supreme leader, Ayatollah Ali Khameini, did not offer any public acquiescence last Friday. Instead, he posted a threat of his own on X: "With this crime, the Zionist regime has prepared for itself a bitter, painful fate, which it will definitely see." HW

Iran Planned to Invade Israel 'From All Sides,' with 'Nuclear Strike,' Thousands of Terrorists, Danon Says

(JNS) – Israel's strikes against Iran last Friday morning were a "calculated and necessary action" that was "carried out in response to an escalating existential threat," Danny Danon, Israeli ambassador to the United Nations, told reporters in New York at the global body's headquarters.



The Islamic Republic has a long history of funding and training terror proxies across the Middle East, but the direct threat from the regime "took a dramatic turn," Danon said. "Iran advanced significantly toward nuclear weapons ca-

Danon pointed to a secret program, which Israeli intelligence uncovered, that showed dangerous Iranian progress toward a nuclear bomb. It also revealed plans for a surprise attack on Israel in coordination with Iran's proxies, with

an invasion "from all sides, with thousands of terrorists and thousands of projectiles" going beyond an Oct. 7-style attack and incorporating "a nuclear strike," the envoy said.

Israel "could not, and would not, wait for that moment to arrive," Danon said.

He noted "an absence of meaningful international consequences" to Iran's "repeated violations" and its "continued deception" amid a recent International Atomic Energy Agency report showing that Tehran's nuclear program was outside the parameters of its international commitments. The report also showed that Iran obscures the details of its nuclear program.

Danon chided António Guterres, the U.N. secretary-general, who issued a statement earlier last Friday expressing "concern" over Israel's operation.

"I must ask: Where was the secretary-general when Iran spent years arming itself while vowing to wipe Israel off the map?" Danon said. "Where was his voice when Iran rained hundreds of missiles and drones on our civilians?"

At Iran's request, the U.N. Security Council is slated to meet at 3 p.m. in New York on Friday – first in an open setting and then behind closed doors to discuss Israel's operation and its after-

"We will not sit quietly while our people are targeted," Danon said. "Not again. Not ever. Empty words will not stop Iran. Israel will." HW

A Weekly Word of Torah Wrongspotting and the Meraglim: When Seeing the Flaws Becomes the Flaw

We've all done it. The program had a typo. The sound system buzzed. The kugel was cold. We don't say it with malice – just a knowing glance, a whisper to the person beside us, maybe a text. It's not sabotage. It's practically a sport. There's a name for this habit: wrongspotting – the instinctive urge to fixate on what's wrong. It feels harmless, even clever. We're not naysayers - we'd never call ourselves that. Naysaying is loud, combative. Wrongspotting is subtle. Social. It makes us feel sharp.

But wrongspotting is more dangerous than it seems. It slips under our radar precisely because it feels innocent. And yet it saps energy, trust and vision - especially in communal life.

In Parashat Shelach, the spies meraglim – are sent to scout the land of Canaan. Their mission? לתור את הארץ – to see. Observe. Report. Instead, they editorialize. They see fortified cities, large people, and immediately decide: this will never work. "We were like grasshoppers in our eyes," they say, "and so we were in theirs" (Bamidbar 13:33). What doomed the mission wasn't the land. It was the lens. Their report had facts - but it also had spin. They didn't just describe. They wrongspotted. They took a few alarming details and constructed a narrative of doom.

Wrongspotting today happens in more mundane arenas: the school event, the community dinner, the newsletter

that arrives with one misaligned photo. The event might be 95% successful. But we focus on the five. And we talk about it. And in doing so, we shrink the story from one of effort and connection into one of error. And here's the problem: when wrongspotting becomes our reflex, we stop seeing things in full color. We distort leadership. Organizers begin planning to avoid critique, not to pursue vision. We lead defensively instead of aspirationally.

At the end of the parsha, we get the mitzvah of tzitzit (fringes attached to the corners of a four-cornered garment, traditionally worn by observant Jewish men): "You shall see them, and remember all the commandments of God." Tzitzit are visual training. They ask us to see with purpose, not paranoia. To notice not the flaw but the calling.

A wise school board member once said: "Every critic is a potential volunteer." What if we invited those who point out what's wrong to help make it right? What if we redirected that sharp eye toward building instead of fault-finding?

Our Memphis Jewish communities thrive not because they're flawless, but because they're generous with what they choose to see. We can't control what goes wrong. But we can control what we spotlight.

Did I miss something? In the JTA article of the 5/29/25 issue of The Hebrew Watchman on the murder of the two Israeli staffers in Washington, D.C., only one of them, Yaron Lischinsky, is mentioned, while the name of the oth-

er victim, Sarah Milgrim, is completely omitted. It's not as if it took any extra time to identify her; after all, their picture, along with their names, were released as soon as the awful news of the tragedy was published. So, not only was she, Sarah Milgrim, not acknowledged as the other victim, but in a horrible coincidence, she was born in the same city where 11 years ago there occurred the murder of three people who were cut down by a virulent anti-Semite at the JCC and nearby assisted-living facility there. They were 14-year-old, Reat Underwood, his grandfather, Dr. William Corporon and Terri La Manno.

Several years ago, we were able to thwart a possible tragedy at the Hebrew Academy due to the cooperation of "the powers that be" (police, security people, trained lay folks).

Some of your readers may remember that I wrote a letter (as Meryl Streep said when she received her umpteenth Oscar: "What, her again?") pointing out that although that was a wonderful ending to the incident, the comings and goings of people attending any function that involves Jews or people assumed to be Jewish (ironically none of the three killed in Overland Park, Kansas, was Jewish) makes it "open season" for us. One need only to think of the incident that occurred a week ago in Boulder, Colorado.

Israeli Rescue Team Pulls Baby from Rubble after Missile Barrage

(JNS) - A three-month-old baby was pulled out of the rubble in Rishon Letzion early Saturday morning in the aftermath of the third Iranian barrage of ballistic missiles fired at the greater Tel

Firefighters, police and Magen David Adom paramedics rushed to the scene where a building was directly hit by a missile. Following a complex rescue operation, the baby was pulled out alive and in good condition.

Shortly afterward, the infant's parents were rescued. The scene was one of heavy damage, with fires, ruins and additional residents trapped underneath the rubble.

Police officer Staff Sgt. Aviv Saranga was seen embracing the baby.

"We identified extensive destruction of homes and vehicles and received reports of people trapped," Saranga told reporters at the scene.

"We began rescue operations together with Yasam forces [Police Special Patrol Unit], MDA and the fire and rescue services. We located a large number of trapped individuals, among them an infant just a few months old whom we managed to rescue," she relayed.

"I held the baby for quite some time during the incident," the police officer went on to say. "We also rescued her

family, her parents. I approached them and brought them their baby. They were also trapped and in need of medical care. The baby remained in my arms until she was handed over for medical treatment. We then continued rescuing the rest of the trapped individuals and carried on with our mission - saving lives."

While the rescue operation was underway, "we identified additional launches in the area, [so] I asked people to enter bomb shelters and stay safe. This was a large-scale and highly complex incident," Saranga said.

"I am a police officer in the State of Israel and this is my mission. I felt deep down that I was saving lives. I held the baby in my arms. ... [I felt] a sense of fulfillment. A baby just recently born - there's nothing more rewarding than that. I'm proud of it," she said.

Fire and Rescue Service Capt. Idan Chen was the one who pulled the baby out of the ruins. Speaking to Walla News, he said, "I grabbed [the baby] in my arms and handed her to the first officer I saw, then started pulling the rest of the family out.

"At the same time, there were more people trapped upstairs, others in the apartment next door - and across the way, there was a fire. I had to manage the entire scene, with destruction in every direction. I needed to get all those people out, one by one. I was covered in the blood of those I rescued. It was an extremely complex scene," he said.

In a statement, the Israel Police said it had isolated the scene of the missile strike and searched for trapped individuals and for unexploded ordnance as

As of 7:45 a.m., 20 people were evacuated for further medical care in various injury conditions, the police said.

Three people were killed, and dozens were injured from the missile barrages fired by Tehran overnight last Friday and early Saturday morning.

Yisrael Aloni, 73, was one of two killed in Rishon Letzion.

The Islamic Republic fired about 100 missiles at around 9 p.m. local time, and a few evaded Israel's defense systems and struck two areas in central Israel. About 40 people were wounded, including two who were in severe-to-critical condition. One of the two, Eti Cohen Angel, 74, from Ramat Gan, succumbed to her injuries.

Some others are in moderate condition and the rest had minor injuries, according to MDA. **HW**

Netanyahu Addresses People of Iran, Calls Regime 'Common Enemy'

(JNS) – Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu called for the people of Iran to overthrow the Iranian regime on Friday, saying that Israel and Iranians share a "common enemy."

Speaking in a video message, Netanyahu said that the Islamic republic had "never been weaker" following 24 hours of Israeli strikes on Iranian nuclear and military targets.

"The time has come for you to unite around your flag and your historic legacy by standing up for your freedom from an evil and oppressive regime," Netanyahu said. "This is your opportunity to stand up and let your voices be heard."

"Israel's fight is not with you," he continued. "Our fight is with our common enemy, a murderous regime that both oppresses you and impoverishes you."

The Israeli premier also repeated the slogan of the Iranian women's protest movement, "woman, life, freedom," in both English and Farsi.

"Brave people of Iran, your light will defeat the darkness," he said. "I'm with you, the people of Israel are with you."

Iranian state media reported on Friday that Iran's Supreme Leader Ali Khamenei also delivered a pre-recorded, televised address to the Iranian people.

The ayatollah claimed that he had the people's backing to seek vengeance against Israel.

"We will respond with strength, and we will show them no mercy," Khamenei said. "Life will definitely become bitter for them." **HW**






Croatian Consul, Wife Hurt in Iran Missile Strike on Tel Aviv



them that "their injuries are minor, and they are not in any life-threatening condition."

The foreign minister said the Croatian Embassy in Israel is in constant contact with his ministry and that all necessary measures are being taken to ensure staff safety. "We strongly condemn attacks on civilians and diplomatic facilities. We call for immediate de-escalation and restraint," Grlić Radman added. HW

The Risks of Trying to Time the Markets

Timing is everything – whether it's navigating traffic to get to work on time or getting a table at a popular restaurant. If you miss the window, you might end up stuck in traffic or waiting in line longer than you'd like for dinner. Timing can be tricky for everyday activities, and it's even more challenging when it comes to the markets. If your timing is off with the markets, research shows it could cost you. It's a significant risk.

Making the Right Call

For some investors, timing the market is like calling the right play in football: if you do it right, the risk could be worth the reward. However, if your timing is off, you could end up getting sacked. Missing even a handful of the market's best days can dramatically cut your investment returns. Conversely, missing several of the worst days in the markets can potentially offer higher returns, but the strategy behind trying to miss the bottom of trading can be challenging.

Historically, missing just 10 of the best days in the markets, a very small amount over a 30-year period, would have dropped your annual average rate of return from 8% to 5.26%. Missing 30 days and the drop would have been even more steep to near 1.8%. If you missed 40 days, the drop would have been even more to .44%. Change that to a 50 day miss and your annual return would have hit a negative, -.86% annually.¹

At Least 11 Killed Across Israel Amid Multi-Day Barrage of Missiles from Iran

(JTA) – June 15, 2025 – At least 11 Israelis have been killed in multiple cities as Iran continues to pound the country in response to Israel's ongoing attacks on Iran's nuclear program.

Most missiles sent from Iran were shot down but ones that got through Israel's air defense system struck in cities in the country's center and north. At least seven people – including children – were killed in a direct strike on a building in Bat Yam, a city adjacent to Tel Aviv, while four members of a family of Christian Arabs in a town near Haifa died when a missile struck their home.

The strikes come amid successive barrages that have sent Israelis running to shelters for multiple nights in a row. Israeli officials warn that more attacks are anticipated as the Israeli air force continues to bomb Tehran and other sites in Iran in an attack on Iran's nuclear program, which they said had been on the brink of creating nuclear weapons.

The war has brought travel to a standstill and stranded Israelis abroad and tourists inside Israel. El Al, Israel's national carrier, says it is working on a plan to bring Israelis home using its fleet of airplanes, which it has moved out of the country for safekeeping.

World leaders are calling on Iran and Israel to deescalate. U.S. President Donald Trump, who has been negotiating with Iran to curb its nuclear program since April, said on social media on Sunday morning that he remained optimistic that the conflict could be solved with diplomacy.

"Iran and Israel should make a deal, and will make a deal," he wrote on Truth Social. He added, "We will have PEACE, soon, between Israel and Iran! Many calls and meetings now taking place. I do a lot, and never get credit for anything, but that's OK, the PEOPLE understand. MAKE THE MIDDLE EAST GREAT AGAIN!"

IDF: Air Force Killed More than 20 Iranian Commanders

Iranian Regime's Security Chain of Command

(JNS) – The Israel Defense Forces announced on Saturday that it had killed more than 20 Iranian commanders, including the heads of military intelligence and missile forces, in the opening phase of "Operation Rising Lion."

This announcement adds to Friday's IDF confirmation that several top Iranian commanders – including the heads of the armed forces and the Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps (IRGC) - were killed in Israeli strikes at the start of the

The strikes, carried out by Israeli Air Force fighter jets and guided by precise

intelligence from the IDF Intelligence Directorate, targeted key figures in the Iranian regime's security and military apparatus, delivering what Israeli officials describe as an unprecedented blow to Tehran's operational capabilities.

Decapitating Iran's military leadership

Among those killed in the initial strikes was Brig. Gen. Gholam-Reza Merhabi, head of the Intelligence Directorate in the Iranian Armed Forces General Staff.

Merhabi, regarded as Iran's most senior intelligence officer, was responsible for intelligence assessments, operational planning and combat preparations against Israel over the past year. He was also a close associate of Armed Forces Chief of Staff Maj. Gen. Mohammad Hossein Bagheri, who was also killed in the opening wave.

The IDF confirmed that Mohammad Bagheri, commander of the IRGC's surface-to-surface missile array (not to be confused with the Armed Forces chief of staff), was killed alongside Brig. Gen. Amir Ali Hajizadeh, the IRGC's Air Force commander, and several other senior officials in an underground headquarters in Tehran, where they were reportedly meeting to prepare attacks against Israel.

Blow to Iran's offensive capabilities

The IDF further reported that IRGC commander Maj. Gen. Hossein Salami, the commander of Tehran's Emergency Command, and IRGC Aerospace Force commander Maj. Gen. Amir Ali Hajizadeh were also killed in a series of strikes across Iran conducted by more than 200 Israeli fighter jets.

The operation also killed two additional IRGC Air Force officials: Taher Pur, head of the UAV Force, and Brig. Gen. Daoud Shihyan, commander of Aerial Operations, who were reportedly meeting in an underground command center to prepare attacks against Israel.

The IDF described these slain commanders as central architects of Iran's missile, drone and military strategy, directly responsible for orchestrating assaults on Israel and other regional tar-

Following the strikes, Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei swiftly appointed Maj. Gen. Abdolrahim Mousavi as the head of the armed forces and Brig. Gen. Mohammad Pakpour as the IRGC chief, seeking to maintain continuity in Iran's military leadership.

Targeting Iran's nuclear program

On Friday, the IAF killed nine Iranian scientists who had significantly ad-

vanced Tehran's nuclear weapons program, the military said on Saturday.

According to the IDF, these scientists served as critical "knowledge centers" within the nuclear project, with decades of experience in atomic weapons development

The slain scientists were named as Fereydoun Abbasi, Mohammad Mahdi Tehranshi, Akbar Motalebi Zadeh, Saeed Barji, Amir Hassan Fakhahi, Abd al-Hamid Minoushehr, Mansour Asgari, Ahmad Reza Zolfaghari Daryani and Ali Bakhouei Katirimi.

"The individuals who were eliminated played a central part in the progress toward nuclear weapons. Their elimination represents a significant blow to the Iranian regime's ability to acquire weapons of mass destruction," said the Israeli military.

Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said on Saturday, "In the very near future, you will see Israeli Air Force planes over the skies of Tehran – we will strike at every site and every target of the Ayatollahs' regime."

IDF Spokesperson Brig. Gen. Effie Defrin said in a press briefing on Saturday: "We are striking across Iran as part of 'Operation Rising Lion.' These strikes are being carried out to meet the operation's objective: eliminating the existential Iranian threat to the State of Israel - the nuclear and missile threat." HW

Our G-d is a jealous god, as He repeats many times in his book, and I intend not to denigrate his tolerance. Don't argue with me – argue with Moses, who wrote Exodus 20:5 and a long list of similar declarations. And he is a G-d of punishment. You wanta debate me? Don't waste your time. Go read Isaiah 13:11 if you need emphatic underlining. "I will punish the world for its evil and the wicked for their iniquity." It is clear our G-d, contrary to Christianity, is a G-d who is passionate about justice - turning the cheek is not in his rulebook. He clearly believes in punishment. He also dispenses mercy in carefully measured doses. And when I consider His many quotes announcing his parental philosophy, how else, I reflect, can mankind be civilized? I think of the real world from Sodom and Gomorrah to the 40's of our generation – when we fought the evil threat of Naziism to the current Islamic Murder, Inc. Like Solomon says in Ecclesiastes, "there's nothing new under the sun."

Consider Sodom and Gomorrah. Merciful Abraham eloquently pleads for a reprieve if even ten good people exist in that stew of iniquity. Our patriarch delivers a speech full of eloquence, logic, flattery ("Shall not the judge of all the earth do justly?") strongly implying that a total wipeout is NOT just! But evidently, they can't be found. G-d nukes the two cities of the plain. He either couldn't find ten moral people or he ignored his debate with Abraham and eliminated a

few innocents with the sinners.

Oddly, World War II – two millennia later – the debate reopened. The highest levels of allied leadership debated the bombing of German cities. (By now, man had almost the destructive power of G-d.) Dresden, Hamburg and Berlin not only possessed railroad junctions and armament plants, but innocent men, women and children. The discussion didn't last long. We pulverized those cities like radiation therapy destroys healthy flesh along with the cancer. And maybe ten innocent people were incinerated like the Nazi civilians. Maybe 50, or 500. Who knows?

If we believe in the epiphany at Sinai, we must believe that our creator destroyed thousands in the cities on the plain. Qualifications on both sides, though not stated, could be postulated. You might say: He couldn't find those ten righteous people, the basis of his agreement with Abraham. Evil must be eliminated.

Opposing view: isn't it possible that some of the evil would change; eventually mend their ways? Were the children evil? Consider also some 2-3 millennia before. The flood obliterated mankind. Remember HE wiped out humanity except righteous Noah and his brood and a few animals so we'd have a zoo to amuse us.

These are difficult ethical conundrums for biblical scholars to reconcile with the goodness and mercy Judaism now believes G-d to possess. Do we dare ask: Did HE change, or did WE change? Or must we painfully accept that our G-d, who provides goodness, not only hates evil, but stands ready to enthusiastically eliminate it as we eradicate the malaria germ. This is a question not for me or a yeshiva full of rabbis to answer. It is beyond human ken. But the question still hangs in the air like a cloud over Guantanamo, where innocent thousands were saved by merciless punishment to a few. But those harsh methods must have punished some small measure of innocence. What's the rationalizing arithmetic? 10,000 saved – 4 "innocents" put to pain? Let's face it, the Chumash would never hesitate on that tradeoff. I advocate not – I only point to the Chumash.

Israeli missiles often destroy the terrorist home or car, even if his pals or family go with him to that libidinous Islam heaven. There's nothing new under the sun, said Solomon – even convoluted moral questions. Is there a calculus? Or even a simple arithmetic? One potential killer and three innocents require death to save the lives of 50 other innocents. Is that the deal? Or is it 20 – or a thousand? Who knows?

I would say the faithful believers of G-d's lecture on Sinai (and does that not include all Jews?) would destroy 10,000 sinners – some innocent – to save ten of his people. Do you think the Maloch Hamoves – the Angel of Death – cruising the skies of 1350 BC Egypt, checked the ethical character of his victims? No, says the book. He only looked for the lamb's blood on the door. He has mercy, but also a plentiful supply of wrath.

After consideration of the flood, Sodom and Gomorrah, the plagues, even Guantanamo; that saved thousands of our fellow citizens, we mourn the innocents, but the G-d of our Chumash does not let their peril paralyze our defense of goodness.

Again consider World War II. Military leaders of U.S. and Britain, along with their Air Force chieftains, sat in a highly secured meeting room in London. Their topic, unknown to them, was Genesis, especially the Creator's decision of Sodom and Gomorrah. An awesome decision – made more for G-d than man – faced them. Whether to punish the innocent with the guilty or prolong indefinitely the struggle with the current evil, Nazi Germany? Whether to pinpoint by aerial bombardment tactical military targets or the cities of Berlin, Hamburg, Stuttgart, Dresden, Cologne,

which contained military targets as well as women and children who did not build aircraft, tanks or artillery. But the decision makers followed the theme of Genesis and pulverized the German cities. And had the shade of Abraham been present, his argument for ten innocent Germans would have been as unheeded as the flies that buzzed at the windows. Man has always been less merciful than his creator. The same could be said of the Strategic Air Command - when G-d-like - they chose Hiroshima and Nagasaki for destruction. These decision makers chose the Chumash, not the tenderheartedness of the prophets. Like, for example, Amos.

We know nothing of the heart of G-d. I choose my woods carefully, because we do know His desires of us. A thousand rabbis (and clergymen, too) tell you of his book; and prattle of his wishes. But he, himself, tells us his ways are hidden to us. "Who," "what," "why," even "when," are as obscured as the smoke with which he crowns his mountaintops. Metaphorically, he tells us as much in the Chumash. Our Book abounds in the eternal mystery of good and evil, justice and mercy. According to his Chumash, He will shelter us in the palm of his hand and obliterate us with a clench of that palm if he chooses.

He hates evil. That's clear even to Sunday School children. And he punishes those that harm his people, as he repetitively states in his book. Therefore, I await the earthquake that will devastate the nuclear labs of Iran. Ten innocent deaths? Believe Torah? Then believe that. You say innocents will die. Remember the flood. Remember Sodom and Gomorrah. The calculus is unknown. I advocate not – I only point to our holy book and its lesson.

ISRAEL INSIGHTS Needed: A Political Laser

As I am writing on June 11 there is an immediate legislative threat to the current Netanyahu coalition, thus the Israel Government, perhaps the most serious possibility to date that the Knesset could dissolve the Government and call for new elections. In fact, one Israeli newspaper, Yisrael Hayom (Israel Today), generally supportive of Netanyahu, this morning headlined its first page (in Hebrew of course) "On the Way to Dissolution"

There is to be a vote in the Knesset this evening on a preliminary resolution sponsored by the opposition parties, joined by the Haredi, ultra-Orthodox parties, that would begin the process to bring an end to the current Government. We'll know tonight, or perhaps in the early hours of the morning if the effort is successful, if the legislation is not approved, or if it is withdrawn.

What is different this time? The opposition certainly looks constantly at any and every opportunity to bring down the Government. They are joined this time by the Haredi parties, though Shas is wavering, from within the coalition because they have not received the almost blanket legislation as they were promised to exclude the vast majority of their yeshiva students from being drafted into the Israeli army, the IDF (Israel Defense Forces).

The counterweight is the huge public pressure on the Government, backed by a Supreme Court decision that all sectors of society must serve in the army, especially at this time that the national religious and secular sectors are doing reserve duty far more often, affecting negatively both their families and their businesses, and the IDF is in need of some 100,000 new soldiers. The need is generated by the current extended war being fought on several fronts plus the soldiers who have fallen in battle and the many seriously injured.

I24 News described the immediate situation as follows:

"Opposition parties in the Knesset, Israel's parliament, are set to introduce a bill to dissolve the coalition over the inability to legislate draft exemptions for ultra-Orthodox yeshiva students.

The heads of opposition factions said that "the decision was made unanimously and is binding on all factions... in order to concentrate all efforts on one goal: to overthrow the government."

This comes after Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu attempted to keep Shas and United Torah Judaism in the government, following leading rabbis calling on the parties to leave (the Government) over no progress in legislating a draft law.... The Supreme Court previously struck down bills aimed at

draft exemptions, citing equality amid the current war and the strain on Israelis serving in reserve units."

Netanyahu's political situation is further complicated as several members of Likud, his own party, which he heads, have balked at supporting the draft exemptions. At the top of that list is MK Yuli Edelstein, Chairman of the Knesset Foreign Affairs and Defense Committee. The legislation must pass through his committee, and Edelstein has insisted that any law coming out of his committee would levy strong financial sanctions on draft dodgers. Sam Sokol reports in The Times of Israel that Edelstein's "unwillingness to back down from this position... was what led Haredi leaders to support dissolving the Knesset."

Bibi Netanyahu over the years has proven to be a political magician. Will he be able to produce his magic once again? He has a few hours left to do so and we'll soon know the answer.

However, before we return to that which is political in nature, let's consider briefly some fascinating military news that filled both the Israeli and international press at the end of last month. On May 30, ynetnews reported: "Israel unveiled that using a laser-based defense system it intercepted dozens of drones during recent the war with Hez-

bollah; the system marks a major step in military tech, offering low-cost, highspeed interceptions." The announcement marks the debut of a new phase in defense technology.

In other words, a game changer!

In my humble opinion, what is needed in Israel politically is not simply the dissolution of any single Government, but a political laser that will change the fundamentals of the political system.

Israel must move beyond the current party list system, which produces narrow interest groups and small parties, which ultimately have too much power, even control, of the coalition and thus the Government.


The political game changer would be a fully district or geographic representative system, or at least that in part complementing the current party lists.

IDF Intercepts UAVs, Missile in Wave of Aerial Threats

(JNS) - The Israel Defense Forces reported a series of aerial threats over the past 24 hours, as Air Force defense systems responded to UAVs and missiles targeting Israeli territory.

Between 8:58 and 9:01 a.m. on Saturday, air-raid sirens sounded in the Upper Galilee after two UAVs were detected and intercepted by the IAF. Authorities activated the sirens due to concerns over falling debris from the interceptions.

Between 8:11 and 8:12 a.m., si-

rens were also heard in Judea and the Dead Sea region, where several UAVs launched toward Israel were intercepted.

The IDF confirmed that additional sirens were triggered in several locations following the identification of UAVs launched from Iran. The military emphasized that the IAF continues to intercept and strike aerial threats as necessary, urging the public to follow Home Front Command instructions.

Just after midnight, sirens warned

of a hostile aircraft infiltration in Eilat. The IAF intercepted a suspicious aerial target, while a simultaneous incident in the Arava area remained under review. Shortly thereafter, two more suspicious aerial targets in the Arava region were intercepted by Israeli forces.

On Friday, the IDF reported the launch of a missile from Yemen toward Israel. Sirens sounded in several areas, and the IAF's aerial defense systems were activated to intercept the threat. According to the IDF, the missile ultimately hit in the Hebron area, and no interceptors were launched. Sirens were sounded in accordance with protocol, and the incident remains under review.

The IDF said that all incidents are under ongoing review as security forces remain on high alert. The public is urged to continue following the Home Front Command's defensive guidelines as the IAF operates to eliminate aerial threats wherever necessary. HW

Impacts Seen in Tel Aviv Area After Iran Fires 100+ Missiles in Response to Israeli Attacks

(JTA) June 13, 2025 – This is a developing story.

At least one Iranian missile fell in Tel Aviv on Friday evening amid a barrage responding to Israel's early-morning attack on Iran's nuclear program.

More than 100 missiles were fired in

a first barrage, and a second wave were on their way toward Israel, officials said. Sirens sounded across the entire

Reports were emerging about people injured in the strikes. Videos showing the impacts circulated on social media, but many were deleted quickly amid exhortations by Israeli leaders to shield location data that could aid in the Iranian attack

The impacts came as Iran's supreme leader, Ayatollah Ali Khamenei, gave a televised address. "Today, we must give a strong response to the evil, despicable, terrorist Zionist identity," he tweeted simultaneously. "God willing, we will respond with strength and will show no mercy to them."

Israeli authorities had warned that it was possible that some missiles and drones could evade the country's air defense systems, which have largely deflected missiles sent on earlier occasions by Iran and more recently and regularly by Iran's proxies in the Middle East. HW
