A Silver Celebration: Young Israel of Memphis Marks 25 Years

As the sun's amber rays dipped toward the Memphis horizon on August 31, nearly 300 community members gathered at the University of Memphis Scheidt Family Performing Arts Center for an extraordinary event: Young Israel of Memphis's 25th anniversary Candlelight Concert.

"For 25 years, Young Israel of Memphis has greatly enhanced the lives of all its members and families," says Rabbi Akiva Males of Young Israel of Memphis. "Our shul has served as a home for meaningful Tefilah (prayer), uplifting Torah study, and a space for experiencing the true joy of Jewish religious life."

"Twenty-five years is a major milestone," says Young Israel President Noam Davidovics. "We knew we had to mark the occasion with something beyond a traditional dinner. And so, the concept of our Candlelight Concert was born."

After fervent recitation of Tehillim (Psalms) in support of the Jews of Israel, led by Rabbi Males, the concert began. Award-winning pianist and conductor Tomer Adaddi led The Promised Land Philharmonic Musicians, featuring a talented string trio and Jewish musicians from the Memphis Symphony Orchestra. With the rich, resonant voice of vocalist Omer Shaish, the crowd was treated to a beautifully curated collection of Israeli and Jewish pieces that spoke to the heart.

The first piece – a masterful performance of the Mi Sheberach for the brave soldiers of Israel's Defense Forces – set the tone for the evening. Adaddi's charm and humor captivated the audience as he introduced each piece, from

Elvis's "Can't Help Falling in Love" to a moving rendition of "Bring Him Home" from Les Misérables – a prayer for hostages still held in Gaza. Spirited Chassidic niggunim and a playful interpretation of Fiddler on the Roof's "If I were a Rich Man" had the crowd clapping their hands and stamping their feet.

Local talent shined when 13-year-old Young Israel member Amitai Horowitz joined the ensemble on stage, delivering a stirring performance of Pachelbel's Canon. And the finale, a lively version of Eyal Golan's "Am Yisrael Chaim" brought everyone (including the cellist!) to their feet.

The evening celebrated three remarkable women who embody the congregation's values: Elana Kahane, recipient of the Torah Award, for creating opportunities for Torah study within the com-

munity; Sarah Bracha Wogan, recipient of the Tefillah Award, for her heartfelt prayer leadership; and Esther Katz, recipient of the Tradition Award, for her relentless dedication to the community.

"It was such an unbelievable event, and I was honored to be part of it," Sarah Bracha Wogan reflects. "Being part of our community for all these years has been so rewarding."

Meticulous planning and countless volunteer hours were instrumental in the evening's success. Event chairs Sarah Ardestani and Deena Davidovics led a committee including Sarah Bauer, Adi Brown, Abbe Kaplan and Yocheved Naftel. Kevin Braverman compiled a 52-page playbill with design by Ruthie Rashkin and Chani Karasik. Josh Kah-

Memphis JCC to Engage in Bullying Prevention Month Programming

October is National Bullying Prevention Month, and the Memphis JCC is preparing a month of programming to sup-

port and elevate this important message.

Throughout the beginning of the 2025-2026 academic year the J has been speaking with many area K-12 schools about creating fine art pieces around the theme of bullying. These student-created pieces will be on display from the end of September all through the month of October, in the Shainberg Art Gallery.

On Sunday, October 19, at 2 p.m., the J will host USA Today and Amazon Bestselling Author and 2025-2026 Jewish Book Council, Network Author on Tour, Jacqueline Friedland. She will be speaking about her novel "Counting Backwards." This novel, told in a dual-timeline format explores who "deserves" the right to reproduce.

Young attorney, Jessa Gidney, takes a pro bono immigration case and discovers a shocking pattern of medical abuse in this all-female detention center. As she fights for their rights, she learns of a shocking connection to her own family's past relating to eugenics and the Holocaust

During her time at the JCC Friedland will discuss social justice and upstander behavior present in characters in her novel.

On Sunday, October 26, at 1:30 p.m., the JCC is hosting an Original Speech and Monologue Competition. Like the Youth Art Contest, the Original Speech and Monologue Competition also has a bullying theme. This competition is open to students in grades 6-12. Entries are due by October 9. Information regarding the submission process for the Original Speech and Monologue Competition can be found on the Arts tab of the JCC website by clicking the National Bullying Prevention Month button.

The Original Speech and Monologue

Competition is to be judged by New York-based actress English Bernhardt. Bernhardt was Cady on the First National Tour of "Mean Girls" and toured with Idina Menzel during Menzel's time with "If/Then." Later that evening Bernhardt will perform in "An Evening with English Bernhardt: A Cabaret to Raise Awareness Around the Importance of Bullying Prevention." This one-night-only performance is Sunday, October 26, at 7 p.m. This cabaret is sponsored by Amro Music.


Memphis JCC to Screen "October 8" Film as Part of Local Area October 7 **Commemoration**

"Mountains of the Moon" Poems by Russell H. Strauss



Russell H. Strauss has given Memphis a gift with his recent publication of his best collected poems in a new volume called "Mountains of the Moon."

Author Susan Stevens Chambers says, "Russell Strauss skillfully takes us through significant historical events with narratives that ring with truth and heartfelt emotions. From Jewish issues surrounding Nazi persecutions to Black young men witnessing atrocities in America's South, we are drawn to his descriptions."

One poem, 'Chanukah in Ukraine, 2022" recalls a woman in war torn Ukraine trekking to light Chanukah candles when she "never heard the final crash / nor saw the flash / as she became / herself, a flame."

There are also poems that reflect humor and nostalgia for the poet's adolescence as found in "Rocking with the Wolfman." "it's Saturday night, you cool cats and kittens / down in drive-ins and over in lovers' lanes, / and you're listening to the Wolfman, / voice of station K-L-A-R-K. The D.J. will appear in the Larkin High School Gym and who knows who else may be there -Elvis or Jerry Lee? The date is August 25, 1957."

Russell says one of his favorites in the volume is about his father who was the head of a labor division for temporary workers for the State of Tennessee. Day laborers who reported for employment were down and out on their luck and some rather rough looking. Yet his father always showed them respect: "Good morning, gentlemen,' he always

"Thin smiles appeared on scarred faces. / Tattooed arms reached to remove caps, / as one by one, proud to be addressed; as colleagues and worthwhile human beings, / they returned his greet-

Russell H. Strauss grew up in Memphis and except for three years teaching at schools in small towns, he has always lived here. A graduate of the University of Memphis, he taught for 13 years before moving on to the Tennessee Department of Labor, where he worked for 37 years, retiring in 2013. He has served four terms as president of the Poetry Society of Tennessee and served from 2010 to 2012 as president of the National Federation of State Poetry Societies. He also serves on the board of the Jewish Historical Society of Memphis and the Mid-South and is a volunteer at the Temple Israel Archives.

After Charlie Kirk is Fatally Shot in Utah, Jewish and Israeli Leaders Call for Prayers and End to Political Violence

(JTA) – Israeli and pro-Israeli U.S. Jews were among those expressing concern after Charlie Kirk, the 31-year-old conservative activist who founded Turning Point USA and emerged as a leading voice of the pro-Trump right, was shot last Wednesday during an appearance in Utah.

Kirk was confirmed to have been killed about two hours after the shooting, which occurred around midday as Kirk launched into remarks for his "American Comeback" campus tour at Utah Valley University in Orem.

Video from the scene showed a single gunshot striking Kirk in the head or neck, causing panic among attendees. He was rushed to a nearby hospital. The FBI said it was assisting in the investigation.

Prominent politicians from both political parties quickly condemned the violence. President Donald Trump, who has counted Kirk as one of his most loyal surrogates, called him "a great guy" and urged supporters to "pray for Charlie." Utah Sen. Mike Lee and Gov. Spencer Cox also issued statements of support. California gov. Gavin Newsom posted on X:, "The attack on Charlie Kirk is disgusting, vile, and reprehensible. In the United States of America, we must reject political violence in EVERY form."

Israeli leaders and Jewish activists, some of whom have developed relationships with Kirk through his pro-Israel activism, also reacted with alarm. Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu posted on X: "Praying for @ charliekirk11."

Amichai Chikli, Israel's minister of Diaspora affairs, wrote: "Praying for Charlie."

And Shabbos Kestenbaum, a right-wing American Jewish activist, urged his followers: "Please stop what you're doing and pray for our friend Charlie Kirk. Many in the Jewish community are reciting chapters from the Book of Psalms, and I ask you do the same. Something is deeply broken in America. The political violence must END. GOD HELP AMERICA."

Kirk founded Turning Point USA in 2012 while still a teenager. The organization has grown into a powerful platform for conservative youth activism, hosting major conferences and expanding into high schools and churches. Kirk became a regular commentator on Fox News and other right-wing outlets, building a reputation as an outspoken critic of higher education, liberal policies and what he calls "woke culture."

Kirk's Turning Point USA has maintained ties with pro-Israel organizations and regularly hosts pro-Israel speakers at its conferences. Kirk himself has traveled to Israel and praised Trump's policies there, including the 2018 U.S. embassy move to Jerusalem.

This is a developing story. HW

Gael Garcia Bernal, Ayo Edebiri Among 1,200 Hollywood Stars Pledging to Boycott Israeli Film Institutions

(JTA) – Hundreds of top film directors, actors and writers signed onto a pledge last Monday "not to screen films, appear at or otherwise work with Israeli film institutions ... that are implicated in genocide and apartheid against the Palestinian people."

The pledge, which is being promoted by the activist group Film Workers for Palestine, is distinct from other previous arts and culture Israel boycotts in naming specific Israeli cultural institutions the letter's signatories are boycotting. Those include major Israeli film festivals like the Jerusalem Film Festival, Haifa International Film Festival, Docaviv and TLVfest.

Signatories include rising stars Ayo Edebiri, Josh O'Connor and Joe Alwyn (who had a supporting role in the recent post-Holocaust drama "The Brutalist"); veteran performers Olivia Coleman, Tilda Swinton, Gael Garcia Bernal and Javier Bardem; and acclaimed directors Yorgos Lanthimos, Adam McKay and Ava DuVernay, whose film "Origin" compared Nazi rule to slavery and global caste systems.

They join several progressive Jews who have long been vocal pro-Palestinian activists, including Ilana Glazer, Hannah Einbinder, Emma Seligman and Wallace Shawn.

The pledge is the latest demonstration of pro-Palestinian sentiment in the arts world. Over the weekend, a docudrama about the killing of 5-year-old Gazan

child Hind Rajab won a major prize at the Venice Film Festival, which was also marked by large pro-Palestinian protests.

Language in the pledge's "frequently asked questions" page notes that there are "a few Israeli film entities that are not complicit" but does not name them, instead directing its followers to "seek guidelines set by Palestinian civil society." It also specifies that only Israeli institutions, not individuals, are included in the boycott.

The Israeli film community, while often reliant on government funds, is one prominent engine of public critique of the country's treatment of Arabs and Palestinians. This year's edition of the Jerusalem Film Festival included a special screening of "Yes," a no-holdsbarred takedown of post-Oct. 7 Israel by native director Nadav Lapid, as part of a program on "freedom of expression and creativity in Israel"; the festival is among the stated targets of the new boycott.

Film Workers for Palestine also backed a recent campaign targeting the arthouse streaming service Mubi for accepting an investment from a venture fund that also has links to the Israeli military. While the Mubi campaign has been publicly supported by Lapid and fellow acclaimed Israeli director Ari Folman, they have not signed onto the campaign targeting Israeli film institutions. **HW**

6 Shot to Death at Jerusalem Bus Stop in City's Deadliest Attack in Nearly 2 Years

(JTA) – Six people were shot to death and at least six others gravely injured in a shooting on a Jerusalem bus stop last Monday morning, in the kind of terror attack that has become rare in recent years.

Hamas issued a statement celebrating the attack, which ended when the two men carrying it out were killed. An off-duty security officer and a civilian with a gun license reportedly killed the gunmen, Palestinians from the West Bank.

The attack prompted immediate recrimination among politicians as well as military raids on West Bank villages near Ramallah. Israel has a policy of demolishing the homes of those who commit terror attacks.

Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and National Security Minister Itamar

Ben-Gvir, speaking at the scene of the attack, each lay blame with the Supreme Court, which ruled last Sunday that security prisoners in Israeli prisons must be given more food. Netanyahu canceled a planned court date in his corruption trial to respond to the shooting.

The shooting was the deadliest attack in the city since seven people were killed at a synagogue in a nearby neighborhood in January 2023, before the outbreak of the Israel-Hamas war.

It took place at a bus stop at Ramot Junction, an area in Jerusalem's northwest where roads from multiple directions converge and where two children were killed in a terror ramming in early 2023. Three people were shot to death at a bus stop in the same neighborhood in November 2023, during the first ceasefire in the war in Gaza, by two brothers who had been affiliated with Hamas; a fourth person was killed by an IDF soldier who said he mistook him for a terrorist. A bombing at the same bus stop had killed two the previous year.

The latest attack comes as President Donald Trump is pressing for an end to the war in Gaza. He said on TruthSocial last Sunday that the Israelis had accepted his latest terms for an end to the conflict that would include the release of all 48 hostages in Gaza. "I have warned Hamas about the consequences of not accepting. This is my last warning, there will not be another one!" Trump wrote. **HW**





Anti-Israel Protester Bumps Republican Congressman, Gets Pushed Back

(JNS) – An anti-Israel protester reportedly made physical contact with Rep. Tim Burchett (R-Tenn.) last Thursday, leading the congressmember to push the protester.

Politico reported that the confrontation took place outside the Longworth House Office Building on Capitol Hill. The protester approached Burchett and criticized his stance on the Israel-Hamas war before bumping the legislator. What was said was unclear.

Burchett then reportedly shoved the protester.

"Everyone has a right to their opinion, and they can say all of the filthy stuff they want, but they don't have the right to bump the congressman," Burchett spokesman Will Garrett stated.

Capitol Police reportedly questioned the protester but have declined to comment on the incident. It is unclear whether the protester is affiliated with any organization.

Burchett posted a montage last year of verbal confrontations he's had with the anti-Israel group Code Pink, whose members have accosted him on several occasions about the war and his support for Israel.

Burchett said members of the group threatened to kill his wife and daughter, which Code Pink denied. **HW**

Man Linked to Neo-Nazi Groups Pleads Guilty to Attempting to Destroy Nashville Energy Facility

Skyler Philippi, 24, of Columbia, Tenn., was "motivated by a violent ideology," said the U.S. assistant attorney general for national security.

(JNS) – A Tennessee man associated with Neo-Nazi groups pleaded guilty to attempting to destroy an energy facility in Nashville using a weapon of mass destruction, the U.S. Department of Justice announced last Tuesday.

In August 2024, Skyler Philippi, 24, of Columbia, Tenn., told undercover agents that he had written a "manifesto" outlining his intent to attack "high tax cities or industrial areas to let the

kikes lose money," using a slur for Jewish people. The department said he had previous affiliations with white supremacist and Neo-Nazi groups, the Atomwaffen Division and the National Alliance.

"For months, Philippi planned what he had hoped would be a devastating attack on Nashville's energy infrastructure," said John Eisenberg, U.S. assistant attorney general for national security. "Motivated by a violent ideology, Philippi wanted 'to do something big.' Instead, the FBI disrupted his plans, and Philippi now awaits sentencing."

Court documents state Philippi said to undercover agents in July 2024 that he intended to fly a self-built drone with explosives into Nashville electrical substations. In August 2024, he ordered C-4 and other explosives from the undercover agents.

On Nov. 2, 2024, he met with the agents at a hotel and participated in a "Nordic ritual," according to the Justice Department, stating, "This is where the New Age begins." The group then drove to the operation site, where Philippi was taken into custody.

Philippi faces a maximum penalty of life in prison and a maximum fine of \$250,000. Sentencing is scheduled for Jan. 8, 2026. **HW**



And if the bartender gives him change for a twenty instead of a ten, he gloats and keeps it.


He cheats on his wife, on his business associates, and has no time for his kids. My rabbi nods.

ISRAEL INSIGHTS Qatar, Friend or Foe, Part II

On Monday morning, September 8, at one of the busiest intersections in Jerusalem, the Ramot interchange, filled with pedestrians, private cars and public buses, two Palestinian terrorists, armed with machine guns and knives, having crossed the security fence from the West Bank, climbed aboard a public bus and opened fire. Six people, Jewish residents of Ramot, were murdered and some 20 people injured.

Hamas quickly claimed responsibility. On Tuesday, September 9, the Israel Air Force attacked a building in Doha, Qatar, where Hamas leaders had gathered in a pinpointed operation to eliminate Hamas leadership. Prime Minister Netanyahu and Defense Minister Katz issued a joint statement, which included:

"The prime minister and the defense minister believed that the action was completely justified in light of the fact that this Hamas leadership initiated and organized the October 7 massacre, and has not stopped launching murderous actions against the State of Israel and its citizens since then, including taking responsibility for the murder of our citizens in yesterday's attack in Jerusalem."

(This Jerusalem terror attack was particularly chilling personally as it occurred a short walk from where I and my family lived in Ramot for some 33 years.)

Israeli intelligence knew that Hamas leadership had gathered in the Doha location. While at this writing, on September 10, it remains uncertain as to who was killed and who was injured among the Hamas leaders, clear messages were dealt to both Hamas and Qatar. In short, Hamas has learned that it cannot hide in Qatar. Perhaps the latter has learned that its duplicitous actions, mediating negotiations while harboring and providing sanctuary to the terrorists themselves, will no longer go unanswered.

Turning to the media, Israeli and international sources were quick to analyze and comment on the strike in Qatar. As is the norm, some were in favor, others were critical.

Gregg Roman, executive director of the Middle East Forum, wrote on September 9: "Qatar's protection allowed Hamas to preserve its leadership cadre from the attrition that typically degrades terrorist organizations over time. While Israel systematically eliminated Hamas commanders in Gaza - from Mohammed Deif to Marwan Issa - the organization's strategic brain trust remained intact in Doha, ensuring continuity of planning and institutional memory. This arrangement made it functionally impossible to defeat Hamas through military means alone, as the organization could simply regenerate its tactical

losses while its strategic leadership remained untouchable."

Jerusalem Post analyses were decidedly in favor of the Israeli action, with their various headlines themselves telling the story:

"Qatar strike highlights Israel unwilling to negotiate by Hamas's rules," by Zvika Klein, editor, September 9. His subheading: "Explosions in Doha targeted Hamas's political leadership tied to stalled hostage talks, with Israel signaling it will no longer tolerate delays in negotiations."

"Thirty years of Hamas privilege ends in Doha," by Seth Frantzman, September 9

"The Doha message: Israel's Qatar strike shows it speaks the language of the Middle East," by Alex Winston, September 10.

David Horovitz, editor, in The Times of Israel, September 11, was clearly more cautious: "Netanyahu takes a calculated risk on a legitimate target in a deeply problematic location."

Readers of this column might remember a column I wrote in January 2025, titled "Qatar, Friend or Foe." Quoting several sources, I'll repeat just one here: "Yigal Carmon, writing in MEMRI, described the relationship beyond academic terminology: "Every vegetable vendor and taxi driver in the Muslim

world knows the truth about Qatar and its Islamist and anti-U.S. activities, except for the American, European, and Israeli governments and intelligence agencies (who possibly also know but act as if they don't). This is because Qatar developed over the decades a Western image that totally contradicts its actual behavior."

I clearly believe, and have believed for some time, that Qatar is benefiting by playing both sides against the middle. Supporting Hamas financially and politically, and providing the terrorist organization a home base, while seemingly acting as an honest broker and mediator of ceasefire and hostage negotiations, Qatar is rather cynically representing Israel and the United States to the advantage of Hamas.

Will Israel's strike against Hamas in Qatar make a difference? I have my doubts.

Congressman Cohen Says National Guard Won't Solve Memphis' Endemic Problems

MEMPHIS – Congressman Steve Cohen (TN-9) responded last Friday to President Trump's decision to deploy the National Guard in Memphis with the following statement:

"First, I had hoped the National Guard would not be deployed here. Mayor Young told me earlier this week that it was a possibility and that, if Governor Lee decided to send them, he would work to use them in a manner that is secondary and supportive of the police.

"Memphis is not 'a troubled city,' as President Trump has said. We have a crime problem. We do have problems

that may be 'endemic,' but they are the result of centuries of racial discrimination, including slavery that separated families without educational opportunities. Even after they were freed, they faced Jim Crow discrimination in the South. These are the historical facts. What Memphis needs is consistent federal investment in police protection with additional, permanent patrols and community policing to establish relationships. We need programs like the Minority Business Development Center that Trump's Commerce Department just eliminated, which helped create jobs and capital accumulation.

"In the short run, the Guard can help the police in a supportive role. In the long run, Memphis needs federal dollars invested in proven programs.

"D.C. has been my second home for 19 years. I have a condo and a car, and I live in the city after work (not in my office). I do not perceive any change in the level of safety since Trump's deployment of the National Guard in D.C. The president recently went out to a restaurant in D.C. and said that it is now the safest town in the world, and that it is safe to walk anywhere. That's not true. There have not been 'many arrests of very bad people,' as he puts it.

Most of the arrests are for low-level offenses. While D.C. crime is bad, it was declining and doesn't differ much from national trends.

"For Memphis, major investments in proven programs will make a difference; deploying the National Guard through a short publicity stunt will not. I certainly hope this is not a facade for increased ICE enforcement in Memphis. That's what I think this is about, and that would harm our local economy, particularly the tourist and construction industries. This is all about Trump showing the world that he's a tough guy. This is the Trump Show 2.0." **HW**

Rep. David Kustoff Delivers Statement on President Trump's Deployment of the National Guard to Memphis

WASHINGTON – (Sept. 12, 2025) – Following President Donald Trump's announcement of federal National Guard support for Memphis, Congressman David Kustoff released the following statement:

"I support President Trump's decision to send the National Guard to Memphis. I thank the President for his

commitment to curb violent crime. It is important for the long term success in Memphis to have additional and permanent federal law enforcement officers and agents who can work in conjunction with state and local officials. I will continue to work with the White House to secure these important resources." **HW**

British Lawmaker Decried for Speech Invoking the Israeli Army's 'Blood-Soaked Tentacles'

(JTA) – A British lawmaker, Shockat Adam, is drawing outcry after he referred to the Israeli army's "bloodsoaked tentacles" during an address in Parliament last Wednesday.

The comment by Adam, a Malawi-born businessman and optometrist who is an independent, came as the British Parliament discussed Israel's strikes on Hamas leadership in the Qatari capital of Doha and as Prime Minister Keir Starmer prepared to host the Israeli president.

Adam said his niece and her young daughter had been at a library blocks from the scene of the Qatar strike.

"After having witnessed the Israeli army massacre over 60,000 people in Gaza, 19,000 of whom are children, the blood-soaked tentacles of the Israeli army are now reaching closer to home, especially in my case," said Adam, a longtime critic of Israel who decried the British government decision this week not to call Israel's war in Gaza a "genocide."

His phrasing drew criticism from those who said he was echoing longstanding antisemitic stereotypes about Jewish power. Octopuses have been a common element in antisemitic imagery, including that of the Nazis.

"If Shockat Adam has no idea of the historical significance of language like 'blood-soaked tentacles,' then he's grotesquely ignorant, and in no position to participate in this debate," tweeted Tomos Doran, a Welsh commentator. "If he *is* aware, then he really is just a Nazi. It's pretty much as simple as that."

Josh Howie, a Jewish right-wing political commentator, tweeted, "Pretty sure this country, including my grand-parents, fought a war so that Nazis didn't end up in Parliament."

Adam did not draw a rebuke on the floor of Parliament, where the antisemitic symbol has been at the center of a previous controversy. In 2010, British MP Martin Linton faced criticism for warning voters of the "long tentacles of Israel" but later issued an apology after learning of the antisemitic roots of the language.

Adam did immediately address criticism of his rhetoric, which came the same day that Israeli President Isaac Herzog was in London to meet with Prime Minister Keir Starmer. Adam had called on Starmer to reject Herzog's visa

"As Israel prepares a full-scale ground invasion of Gaza [City], Starmer wel-

comes its president to Downing Street with open arms," he wrote in a post on X. "History will judge this as the UK's most shameful chapter of complicity."

Starmer has said Britain would recognize a Palestinian state this month at the United Nations General Assembly if Israel does not agree to a ceasefire with Hamas. In advance of the visit, U.K. officials formally said they had not concluded that genocide is taking place in Gaza, inflaming critics of Israel.

Herzog and Starmer made no public appearance after their meeting. Herzog characterized the meeting as containing "tough" conversation.

"Things were said that were tough and strong, and clearly we can argue, because when allies meet, they can argue," he said. "We are both democracies." **HW**

Qatar to Hold Emergency Arab-Islamic Summit after IDF Strike

(JNS) – Qatar [is scheduled to] host an emergency Arab-Islamic summit in Doha on Sept. 14-15 in the wake of Israel's attack that targeted Hamas's leadership in the city, Reuters reported last Thursday, citing the Qatar News Agency.

"There is a response that will happen from the region. This response is currently under consultation and discussion with other partners in the region," Qatari Prime Minister Mohammed bin Abdulrahman Al Thani said in an interview with CNN's Becky Anderson last Wednesday.

The participants will decide on a course of action, he said.

"We are hoping for something meaningful that deters Israel from continuing this bullying," Mohammed added.

United Arab Emirates President Sheikh Mohammed bin Zayed Al Nahyan flew to Doha last Wednesday to express his country's solidarity, the BBC reported.

Saudi Arabia's Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman is expected to arrive in Doha on Thursday. The BBC cited him as saying that Israel's "brutal aggression" required a response.

Qatari officials have remained tightlipped about the fate of the Hamas leadership, which convened in Doha to discuss the latest Washington offer to reach a ceasefire in Gaza.

Qatar's interior ministry identified the bodies of three of the five lower-level Hamas members, all confirmed dead by Hamas, along with that of a Qatari security officer, who were present at the site.

The terrorist group stated that Israel failed to kill its top members.

Qatari authorities were still searching for the two other lower-level terrorists, according to the BBC. The Ministry of Interior announced that the funeral prayer for the martyrs of the Israeli targeting, including the Martyr of Duty, Corporal Badr Saad Mohammed Al-Humaidi Al-Dosari, a member of the Internal Security Force (Lekhwiya), will be held after Asr prayer today,


"The Ministry of Interior announces that the funeral prayer for the martyrs of the Israeli targeting ... will be held on the afternoon of Thursday, September 11, 2025, at Sheikh Mohammed bin Abdul Wahhab Mosque, and they will be buried in the Mesaimeer Cemetery," the ministry tweeted last Thursday.

Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu last Thursday invoked the memory of the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks on the United States as he defended Israel's strike in Qatar targeting those behind the Oct. 7, 2023, massacre.

"We remember September 11. On that day, Islamist terrorists committed the worst savagery on American soil since the founding of the United States," Netanyahu said. "We also have a September 11. We remember October 7. On that day, Islamist terrorists committed the worst savagery against the Jewish people since the Holocaust."

The Hamas officials targeted in Doha had for years directed the Palestinian terrorist group's operations, were directly responsible for the Oct. 7, 2023, massacre and have been managing the ongoing war against Israel, according to an Israel Defense Forces statement.

The military said measures were taken to minimize civilian casualties, including the use of precision munitions. It added that efforts would continue with determination to defeat Hamas. **HW**

GOP Rep. Nancy Mace to Jewish Progressive: 'I Have a Good Surgeon if You Ever Want to Get Your Nose Done'

(JTA) – A Republican member of Congress who has been a vocal opponent of campus antisemitism told a progressive Jewish Democrat last Wednesday to "get your nose done."

Rep. Sara Jacobs and multiple progressive watchdogs denounced Rep. Nancy Mace's comments as antisemitic.

Mace directed the comment at Jacobs, a California congresswoman, on the social network X, in the midst of a spat over health care for transgender women.

"To @RepSaraJacobs, I talk about women's safety and your response is commentary about my body on the House floor," Mace wrote last Wednesday. "If you knew anything about survivors you would know some women change their bodies because of the trauma of sexual violence. They live with the consequences for a lifetime."

She then added, "PS – I have a good surgeon if you ever want to get your nose done."

Jacobs responded, "I didn't say anything about your body but thanks for confirming! And going with the Jewish nose joke...very creative (and also very antisemitic)."

The idea that Jewish noses are unattractive is a longstanding antisemitic stereotype that has in the past fueled widespread use of cosmetic surgery by Jewish women.

The Nexus Project, a left-leaning antisemitism watchdog group, said on the rival social network BlueSky that Mace's comments were "antisemitic, schoolyard bullying about their Jewish colleagues' noses generally, and especially in a post about respecting women's bodies."

The Jewish Democratic Council of America also denounced the comments. "Telling a Jewish woman to get a nose job is antisemitism," it said in a statement on social media. "Full stop."

The spat came amid a debate between the two lawmakers on the House floor over a proposed Mace amendment to a defense spending budget that would have restricted transgender service members from accessing certain health care procedures and using the restroom that corresponds to their gender identity.

Addressing Mace, Jacobs had defended "gender-affirming care" by noting that many of her colleagues had received procedures that could be classified as such.

"I think it's very interesting that my colleague from South Carolina is so obsessed with the issue of trans people, using horrible slurs to talk about them when many people in this body have received gender-affirming care," Jacobs said. "Filler is gender-affirming care. Boob jobs is gender-affirming care. Botox is gender-affirming care. Lots of my colleagues have received gender-affirming care."

Mace shot back, "Absolutely ridiculous." She followed up with her nose comment on social media shortly after.

Mace, who has frequently made comments disparaging transgender people after taking a more moderate stance earlier in her career, has also sought to style herself as a warrior for Israel and against antisemitism. She has met with the Anti-Defamation League to discuss college campuses, supported a full federal defunding of Harvard University over charges the school harbored antisemitism, and hosted a press conference with the Orthodox student group Olami to advocate for changes to the Department of Education's handling of campus antisemitism.

Last month she announced a run for South Carolina governor, calling herself "Trump in high heels."

Jacobs has family members in Israel and has found herself walking the tight-rope of many Jewish progressives after Oct. 7. She also revealed this week that she had undergone a process to freeze her eggs so she could defer having children until she is older, an option she said she believes should be accessible to U.S. women.

Jacobs, who says she has a trans sibling and another who is gender-nonconforming, said Mace "is intentionally targeting a vulnerable group of people because she wants the attention. It is cruel. It is malintended. And it is not just about 'she said something wrong once.' This has been a very strategic targeted approach she has taken." She did not further mention the nose comment. HW
